Donne, Milton, and the End of Humanist Rhetoric

by Thomas O. Sloane

Centering on the differences between Donne's literary voice and Milton's, Sloane challenges the usual view that Donne is a late scholastic and Milton a late humanist. He argues that Milton may have sounded like a humanist but Donne actually wrote like one. By examining the writings of Cicero, St. Augustine, and Erasmus, as well as lesser known English humanists and anti-humanists, Sloane establishes the context within which Donne and Milton worked. His book both traces the end of humanist rhetoric and suggests the value of its retrieval.
