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

DONNE RETURNS TO LOSELEY



Loseley Park, located near Guildford, Surrey, has been the historic home of the More-Molyneux family since the reign of Henry VIII, when Sir Christopher More, a direct ancestor of the present owner, purchased Loseley Manor. His son, Sir William More, built the present house during 1562-68; and his grandson, Sir George More, inherited Loseley on the death of his father. Sir George was the father of Anne More (1584-1617), the wife of John Donne.

On 18-20 May 2000, Donne scholars from 14 countries gathered at Loseley Park to celebrate and discuss the works of Anne's husband. Sponsored by *John Donne Journal*, the Donne Variorum, and the John Donne Society, the conference included essays printed in this volume of *John Donne Journal*, tours of the house and of significant sites in the area—including the More family chapel at St. Nicolas Church, Guildford, "Queen Elizabeth's summerhouse" at Pyrford Place, and the Surrey History Centre in nearby Woking.

This volume of the journal is dedicated to James and Susan More-Molyneux, in gratitude for their generous hospitality, their helpfulness, and their friendship.
