Updating the John Donne Listings in Peter Beal's Index of English Literary Manuscripts, II

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The following list promotes another manuscript to Peter Beal's list of main manuscripts (those having more than ten complete or partial Donne poems) (*Index of English Literary Manuscripts* [London: Mansell, 1980], I, ii, pp. 250-59); locates additional, previously unrecorded poems within manuscripts already listed in Beal's *Index*; and completes two entries in Beal's *Index* and two in his "More Donne Manuscripts," *John Donne Journal* 6 (1987), 213-18.

University of Illinois manuscript 821.08/c737/17 (previously credited with only three poems: II. 1-12, "The Comparison" [DnJ 714]; II. 1-8, "The Dampe" [DnJ 874]; and II. 1-20, "The Extasie" [DnJ 1269]) actually contains forty-seven poems and belongs with the sixty-nine main manuscripts listed by Beal in his Donne Introduction plus the two—MS Bedford 26 (owned by the Duke of Bedford) and Christ Church, Oxford, MS Evelyn 254—added in "Manuscripts." This manuscript of 135 leaves is a commonplace book of verse and drama with entries in several hands and was likely owned by Peter Save (who signed the inside front cover and f. 133) and Joseph Butler (who signed and dated the manuscript "1743" on f. 59v and f. 109v).

The format of the following entries corresponds to that in Beal's *Index* with two exceptions: the inclusive sigla in the *Index* for manuscript versions of the poems and the Variorum Edition of the Poetry of John Donne short form for the poem follow the title/first line of the poem as given in the *Index*.

Four additional entries in Beal's *Index* and "Manuscripts" can now be completed: Beal traced the first two from the sale of Lot 135 in the Arthur A. Houghton, Jr. sale at Christie's on 13 June 1979 to Maggs and thence to the Huntington but did not get the final manuscript shelfmark, and the latter two had their manuscript locations inadvertently omitted in the transfer of Beal's "Manuscripts" from typescript to print:

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Notes

¹ In his *Index* (DnJ 2975), Beal includes this stanza, beginning "T'is true 'tis day what if itt bee", as part of a "Copy of an 18-line version" of *Song* ("Stay, O sweet, and do not rise"). The first six-line stanza of *Song* was printed as the first stanza of *Breake of day* in the 1669 collected edition of John Donne's *Poems*; however, *Song* is now generally included among Donne's dubia. The authentic first stanza in the Advocates' MS 19. 3. 4, then, deserves a separate entry under *Breake of day*.
